Author Lida Sideris brings another murder mystery to life in her new book 'Murderous Means'

ocal author Lida Sideris has just finished the sixth book in her Southern California Mysteries series,titled "Murderous Means," which will be released on Dec. 5. Sideris will be holding a book signing from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 16, at The Book Loft in Solvang.

"So far, I've concocted seven murders - on the page, of course," Sideris said. "That includes six novels and one short story, all with homicides or possible homicides that need to be solved.

"Fortunately, the criminal is always caught by my heroine, Corrie Locke, a young lawyer whose desk job regularly takes a backseat to her penchant for crime-solving. After all, she knows a thing or two about investigations, thanks to her P.I. dad."

Sideris said she has always been a fan of famed literary teen detective Nancy Drew. She loved how she never sat on the sidelines.


"She was a multi-talented, young woman of action and a snazzy dresser, to boot," Sideris said. "Who doesn't love a heroine who takes control of her life and does things? Case solved, and she's on to the next one."

It was those Nancy Drew novels that eventually inspired Lideris to create a character and stories of her own.

"I'd been wanting to write mystery novels since I first read Nancy Drew as a child, but I never thought that I could," she said. "It wasn't until after my younger son started college that I came into my own and my first novel was either."

that a whole town is fictional. The main events take place in the tiny town of Los Ranchos (population 1,200). It's kind of like a Mayberry sandwiched between two Southern California powerhouses: the cities of Calabasas and Malibu. That is, if Mayberry looked like a movie set from an old Hollywood western."

The book's plotline was spurred by articles Lideris read concerning psychics.

"After reading articles about psychics and the tools they use to make 'high probability generalizations' that encourage people to become believers, I had to ask what would happen if my heroine met a psychic head-on?" Sideris continued. "Then I heard about the unexpected death of a wealthy matriarch of a family; her passing was deemed to be of natural causes. A seemingly peaceful death ... until Corrie again

and 'Murderous Means' is no different, except all that peaceful? We have to find out what happened.' And that's exactly what we did, on the page, of course, in 'Murderous Means.'"

> Preceding "Murderous Means," Sideris' mystery novels include "Murder and Other Natural Disasters," "Murder Gone Missing," "Murder Double or Nothing," "Slightly Murderous Intent," and "Gambling with Murder," all of which will be available locally at the Book Loft, the library, Barnes & Noble, Amazon, and most book stores after Dec. 5.
